China and USA - The US and China have agreed on measures to tackle climate change but stopped short of committing to end fossil fuels, a joint statement said.

Qatar - A year after the World Cup kicked off in Qatar in 2022, Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch have published briefings examining progress on migrant workers' rights in the emirate.
