

# **Resource Note on Human Rights and Waste Management**

## February 2023

### Summary

The waste and recycling sectors are complex with long supply chains that can incorporate many different actors, brokers and types of management processes. Both sectors have relatively low visibility and workers can be engaged in both informal and formal employment in regions across the world.

Some of the human rights risks associated with the sector are around:

- Long working hours
- Exposure to hazardous waste and e-waste
- Low skilled workforce therefore vulnerable to exploitation
- Migrant workers, agency and temporary workers vulnerable to infiltration by organised crime with less traceability than employed staff.

In the UK 66% of modern slavery cases dealt with by the Hope for Justice charity involved a recycling or waste facility. (2017)<sup>1</sup>
